Professor Athene Lane Trials Research in Population Health Sciences University of Bristol



Professor Declan Devane Health Research Methodology University of Galway

Athene Lane is a Professor in Trials Research in Population Health Sciences, University of Bristol. She is also a Senior Trial Methodologist in the Bristol Trial Centre. Her main research interests are in designing and conducting feasibility and definitive trials of healthcare and lifestyle interventions across a range of clinical areas. She has coordinated the NIHR HTA randomised trial of treatments for localised prostate cancer – ProtecT and the ten year median outcomes had international impact. Her research also includes the role of diet in cancer, PROMS design and utilisation. Fellow of the Society of Clinical Trials and Deputy Editor of Clinical Trials.

Declan trained as a nurse and a midwife, meandered (with the help of opportunity, interest and luck) his way into trial methodology and evidence synthesis and his work now focusses on a blend across randomised trials and synthesising evidence across a number of clinical areas. Declan is the Chair in Health Research Methodology and Deputy Dean of the College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences at the University of Galway. He is also the Scientific Director of the HRB-Trials Methodology Research Network, Director of Evidence Synthesis Ireland and Director of Cochrane Ireland. He has served on numerous Trial Steering Committees and Data Monitoring Committees.

Dr Fiona Manning Programme Manager Clinical Trials and Infrastructures Health Research Board



Professor Olivia Wu Co-Director, Health Economics and Health Technology Assessment (HEHTA) Research Group, University of Glasgow Chair, NIHR Clinical Evaluations and Trial Funding Committee Fiona is Programme Manager for the HRB Clinical Trials and Infrastructures portfolio. She is responsible for managing the portfolio of HRB's clinical research investments, which includes infrastructures (Clinical Research Facilities, Cancer Trials Groups and Network, Clinical Trials Networks, TMRN, NCTO) and trial activities funding programmes (DIFA). Prior to her role at HRB, Fiona was Senior Research Officer at the Office for Research and Innovation at RCSI, where she managed support for researchers for national research funding programmes, including HRB and SFI, and played a leading role in developing the university's activities in PPI in research.

Olivia holds the William R Lindsay Chair of Health Economics and is Co-Director of HEHTA at the University of Glasgow. Her research spans across a wide range of clinical areas but focuses on adapting and applying HTA methodologies in context. She has led numerous economic evaluations alongside clinical evaluations and trials, which influenced health intervention adoption decisions. She also has a body of work on novel and effective use of evidence synthesis approaches to maximise the value of existing data for informing clinical and economic evaluations. Her work has informed clinical guidelines and health policy decisions, both at national and international levels. Olivia collaborates widely and is chief and co-Investigators of active research projects with a cumulative value of over £50 million. In addition to her research, Olivia is a long-standing advisor to HTA agencies within and out with the UK. She has previously served as member of the NICE Technology Appraisal committee for 10 years.

Professor Alistair Nichol Critical Care Medicine University College Dublin



Professor Carrol Gamble Professor of Medical Statistics University of Liverpool

Professor Alistair Nichol is the Chair of Critical Care Medicine in University College Dublin and the Director of the Irish Critical Care- Clinical Trials Network and Consultant in St Vincent's University Hospital, Dublin. He has been an investigator on peer reviewed grants worth over 65 million euros from Ireland, Europe, Australia, New Zealand and Canada. He has completed the hat trick of first author publications- in NEJM, Lancet and JAMA. Currently he is completing trials in the critically ill which will randomize over 20,000 patients in the next 5 years. He has academic interests in Pandemic Preparedness, Cardiac Arrest, Trauma and Mechanical Ventilation.

Carrol Gamble is a Professor of Medical Statistics at the University of Liverpool, an NIHR Senior Investigator and Director of the Liverpool Clinical Trials Centre, a fully UK Clinical Research Collaboration (UKCRC) registered Clinical Trials Unit (CTU). Carrol is a member of the Trials Methodology Research Partnership Statistical Analysis and Health Informatics Working Groups and co-chairs the Data Sharing sub group. Carrol chaired the UK network of statisticians in UKCRC registered Clinical Trials Units for 10 years, was a member of the UKCRC registered CTU group on data sharing and is now deputy Chair for the Policy Group.

Alan is Professor of Medical Statistics and Clinical Trials at the University of Nottingham, and Director of the Nottingham Clinical Trials Unit. He works collaboratively on large, multicentre randomised trials across a wide range of clinical specialties and settings. Alan is an experienced member and chair of Steering and Data Monitoring committees.

Andrew is the Professor of Clinical Epidemiology at University of Galway and Consultant Nephrologist at Galway University Hospitals. He is the former Director of the HRB Clinical Research Facility Galway and MSc Clinical Research at University of Galway and is an experienced clinical trialist. In addition to leading core research infrastructure at University of Galway (providing supports to investigators for a broad clinical trial portfolio) he also has experience as Chief Investigator, Trial Steering Committee Member, Data Safety and Monitor Board Chair and Chair of Event Adjudication Committee and is a Member of the National Research Ethics Committee for Clinical Trials.

Head of Research Governance & Integrity University of Birmingham Matt Sydes was part of the DAMOCLES project in data good practice for Data Monitoring Committees where he undertook two reviews on DMC use and practice, and co-led the development of the IDMC charter which is now commonly used in academic trials. Matt has extensive experience of designing, running, analysing and disseminating clinical trials and associated methodology. He leads the Trial Conduct Methodology research area at MRC CTU at UCL. He has attended nearly 300 IDMC and TSC meetings as an independent member, and many more as a reporting statistician.

Birgit joined the University of Birmingham as Head of Research Governance & Integrity after 11 years in this role at the University of Bristol. Prior to this, she worked 20 years in the NHS as a Research Assistant in Surgery, preimplantation QA lead for the national abdominal aortic aneurysm screening programme, NHS R&D Manager and Trust Innovation Lead. She completed her PhD in the Wellcome Unit for the History of Medicine at Glasgow University looking at Breast Cancer treatment and patient narratives. Birgit has worked for the Leonard Cheshire Foundation (an international Foundation that has the aim of changing attitudes towards disability) and has completed a degree in History and Women's studies.

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
